Lily Lane primary School: Pupil Premium (FSM ever 6)

The government believes that the pupil premium funding, which is additional to the main school funding, is the best way to address inequalities between children eligible for free school meals and those children who are not. Pupil premium funding is used to tackle disadvantage in order to reach the pupils who need it most.

Schools are currently given £1320 per pupil for those families who have registered for Pupil Premium. This includes any child who has been registered for FSM at any point during the past 6 years. The children of members of the armed forces are also entitled to this funding. Schools also receive £1900 for each pupil who has been looked after for 1 day or more, has been adopted from care or has left care under a special guardianship order, a residence order or a child arrangement order.

The money is given to schools to support them enabling all pupils to reach or exceed the nationally expected level for their age. Each school may decide how best to use the funding and they are held accountable for how it has been used to support low income families.

It is by providing excellent teaching and supported specific help to enable pupils who are falling behind to catch up quickly (and those who are exceeding to be stretched further) that each can reach their full potential.

We work with our families and colleagues to ensure that everyone involved with the child has high aspirations. We ensure pupil premium children are well represented in events and have a voice on our school council.

We also recognise that barriers to achievement take many forms and we will do whatever it takes to support a child both in and out of the classroom. Enabling pupils to develop wider skills, talents and experiences, support with home learning and participating in clubs, school visits and journeys play an important role and should be accessible to all. We use all our resources to ensure that every child has an equal opportunity to become an empowered and successful learner.
