

Our Spotlight shines on Mr Andy Hughes, our deputy site manager, who helps to keep Chorlton Park looking clean and


tidy. Mr Hughes is a dab hand building, marking, creating and gardening. He has been busy helping Gardening Club develop areas of the school grounds

They were encouraged to communicate their ideas clearly and present their thoughts to the group.
